









Human Rights: Constitutive Movements, Intellectual Practices and Shifting Global Contexts

On 25 and 26 May, 2015, there will be a two-day symposium on *Human Rights: Constitutive Moments, Intellectual Practices and Shifting Global Contexts.* The symposium is hosted by the Human Rights Committee of the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences, the Royal Swedish Academy of Letters, History and Antiquities, and the Swedish Academy in cooperation with Riksbankens Jubileumsfond (the Swedish Foundation for Humanities and Social Sciences) and the Swedish Collegium for Advanced Study.

There is a need to consider the history and meaning of human rights. Scholarly contributions in the last decade have significantly changed our understanding of that history. It is important to take stock of the ways in which conceptions of human rights have entered into legal frameworks but also into discussions of environmental, cultural and political concerns. In fact, questions of human rights are being addressed not only by legal institutions and in international arenas but also in a variety of ways in scientific, medical and literary practices. Also, it is necessary to assess if and how notions of human rights can be further articulated so as to serve as efforts to reduce human suffering and to contribute to a slightly more humane and liveable world in the future.

The symposium will take place in Stockholm. On the first day, 25 May, it will be held at the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences, and on the second day, 26 May, at the Swedish Academy.
