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ABOUT MARGARET LEVI

Margaret Levi is Sara Miller McCune Director of the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences (CASBS) and Professor of Political Science, Stanford University. She earned her BA from Bryn Mawr College and PhD from Harvard University. She is a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the American Academy of Political and Social Sciences, the American Philosophical Society, and the National Academy of Sciences. In 2002, she was a John Simon Guggenheim Fellow. She served as President of the American Political Science Association from 2004-05. Her books include the sole-authored *Of Rule and Revenue* and *Consent, Dissent, and Patriotism* and the co-authored *Analytic Narratives; Cooperation without Trust?; In the Interest of Others*; and *Labor Standards in International Supply Chains*. She is general co-editor of the *Annual Review of Political Science* and an editor of *Cambridge Studies in Comparative Politics*. Levi is the 2019 recipient of the Johan Skytte Prize.

ABSTRACT

Investigations across history and countries reveal that the more trustworthy the government, the more likely it is to evoke observation of its laws and acquiescence to policies. Less clear is the link between perceptions that government is trustworthy and beliefs that it is legitimate, at least in countries claiming or trying to be democratic. Trustworthiness is, at best, a necessary but not sufficient condition for legitimating beliefs.
